Every State has basic rights and protections for victims of crime. Individual states definitions of victims and specific rights do vary, but core rights for crime victims include:

- ✓ The right to attend criminal justice proceedings.
- √ The right to be heard and participate in criminal justice proceedings.
- √ The right to be informed of proceedings and events in the criminal justice process, of legal rights and remedies, and of available services.
- **✓** The right to protection from intimidation and harassment.
- ✓ The right to apply for compensation.
- ✓ The right to restitution from the offender.
- ✓ The right to prompt return of personal property seized as evidence.
- ✓ The right to a speedy trial.

You also have the right to the enforcement of these rights.

In addition, nearly 2/3 of the States have adopted amendments to their State Constitutions guaranteeing rights that give crime victims further constitutional rights:

- ✓ To be treated with fairness, dignity and respect.
- ✓ To be informed of proceedings and events, such as the release
 of the defendant.
- ✓ To attend the trial and other proceedings.
- ✓ To be heard at critical points in the criminal justice system, such as sentencing or parole hearings.
- ✓ To be awarded restitution from a convicted offender.
